# The Regiment is Coming!

Fort Harrison will welcome the Virginia Regiment, George Mercer Company, on Saturday, April 13, 2019. The company will be setting up their encampment with tents and equipage on the grounds around Fort Harrison. The Muster of the company will include a drill, musket demonstrations and the firing of several volleys. The focus of their interpretation is on the role of the Virginia Regiment here in the Shenandoah Valley during the French and Indian War.

George Mercer, the commander of the company, attended the College of William and Mary and may have begun his career as a land surveyor. His family plantation, Marlborough, was located near the Potomac River in Stafford County. The Mercers enjoyed a close connection with both the Mason and Washington families

He went on to join the provincial Virginia Regiment (at the onset of the French and Indian War), serving as a lieutenant. Mercer fought and was wounded at the Battle of Fort Necessity under the command of Lt. Colonel George Washington.

The following summer of 1755, he and his commanding officer were serving under British General Braddock on the march to recover Fort Duquesne (present day Pittsburgh) from the French. This campaign was doomed to failure, when the French and Indians attacked the British troops near the





Monongahela River and slaughtered hundreds of British Regulars and Virginia Provincial troops. Mercer survived that day and went on to be a captain of his own company (Mercer Company) under Colonel Washington. He also served as Washington's aide-de-camp.

Mercer's initial company, along with two others, provided carpenters for the building of Fort Loudoun in Winchester. Fort Loudoun would serve as Colonel Washington's headquarters during the French and Indian War.


George Mercer's brother, Captain John Fenton Mercer, was killed and scalped at the Battle of the Great Cacapon, fought near Fort Edwards in April,1756. Colonel Washington writes to Governor Dinwiddie and mentions finding Mercer's body after the attack:

"...I have sent down an Indian scalp which was taken off at the place where Captain Mercer had his engagement. He [Captain John Mercer] was found thrust under some rocks, and stones piled up against them."

As a militia captain during the French and Indian War, Daniel Harrison would have been one of the first veterans in this community. The oldest stone in the cemetery is that of Mary Harrison who died in 1794 at age 26. It is believed that Daniel Harrison and other family members are buried near her grave.


